Last month you learned our request to host a One-Day-Advance had been granted. The event was described as an opportunity to advance our understanding of, our desire to, and our proficiency in being the vibrant and fruitful congregation we are called and gifted to be. We are a loving and concerned group of individuals serious about living out our faith. We have nothing to apologize for and nothing of which we need to be ashamed. Any right thinking person is honored to be part of Nashville United Methodist Church, and is willing to work to make us the best we can be for the glory of God.

So... how did the One-Day-Advance go? First let me say thank you to the thirty people who gave up their Sunday afternoon. With worship in the morning, lunch following, and the afternoon spent in meetings and group sessions it turned out to be a long day. But it was (at least in my opinion) a fruitful day. We talked about our dreams for Nashville UMC. We come to grips with some of the challenges of seeing those dreams become reality. We learned about some of the tools that are available to us as United Methodist. We were given some practical first steps to take in preparing ourselves for the opportunities that are before us.

We asked God - on behalf of the whole church - to forgive us for wanting our own way above God's, for thinking we know best, even

when God's Word says differently, and for praying "Thy will be done," yet pursuing our own. We were reminded that Jesus is "the vine" and that without Him "we can do nothing." We received from the Holy Spirit - also on behalf of the whole church - the gift of renewal, healing, and boldness to go forth in our calling to be disciples of Jesus Christ.

When we shared our dreams for the future we learned that our deepest desire was to be a church that reached out to, nurtured, and assimilated children, young families, youth, and young adults. It would not be unlike God to make our biggest challenge our deepest desire. Nor is this an "impossible dream." We also learned that only 25% of the people in these age brackets are in church on any given weekend.

There are six things about all of this that I know for sure. I know we are talking about things that take time to happen. I know that the work before us is difficult, demanding, and worth the trouble. I know that this work cannot be done in our own strength or through our own resources. I know that God will be with us every step of the way. I know that the longer we wait to act the more difficult our work will become. I know that our deepest desires cannot become reality unless we are willing to look honestly at who we are, who we want to be, and what we are willing to do to move from one to the other.

God's love and grace are amazing. We know this from firsthand experience. It is only natural that we want to share this amazing love and grace with others. It is only

natural that we would want to do this in ways that bring a sense of joy and excitement to both ourselves and others. It is a good time to be a Follower of Jesus Christ. It is a good time to invite others to be the same. It is a good time to be a part of a family of believers who will not shrink before challenges. It is a good time to be a part of Nashville United Methodist Church.

Support needed for US storm disaster

The United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) needs our support in assisting thousands of residents of southern states in cleaning up after devastating storms this spring. Even as cleanup is under way in those areas hardest hit by April's historic tornado outbreaks, and as the muddy Mississippi River rises today to levels unseen in more than seven decades, the work of UMCOR is just beginning.

In the past six weeks, UMCOR has disbursed close to \$200,000 in emergency grants to annual conferences dealing with the fallout from massive tornadoes, flooding, the threat of flooding, drought and wildfires. Thousands of people have been displaced and many of the churches have been damaged or destroyed. The sheer magnitude of storms and other emergencies has far out-paced UMCOR's financial ability to respond. Already UMCOR is drawing on reserves in order to fulfill its unshaken and absolute commitment to the annual conferences and communities that have been directly affected by this year's historic spring storm season. UMCOR is grateful for the generosity of our United Methodist family for their support of UMCOR's work around the world and is mindful of the sacrifice their compassion so often implies. We know that caring for the earth is part of our spiritual calling. And we know that, in part, that means we must use less energy in our homes. Yet, the sheer quantity of actions to take is overwhelming. The "Action of the Month Program" from the Social Concerns Committee focuses on manageable tasks, an area at a time, encouraging the whole congregation to accomplish that one task, creating a sense of camaraderie and ensuring that important steps will be taken.

June Action of the Month

(Estimated savings up to \$60 per year)

Wash clothes in cold water and air-dry clothes whenever possible.

Tips:

1. Before hanging wet clothes, fluff in a dryer for a few minutes to prevent wrinkles.
2. Use portable drying racks, retractable clotheslines, shower rods, or install a closet rod in a laundry room.
3. Shirts and blouses dry well on hangers.
4. Clothes last longer (especially elastic) when not subjected to dryer heat.
5. If you are in the market for a new washer, consider front-loading models. They require less water and extract more water, so drying time is less.

*Of the major electrical appliances in a typical American household, the clothes dryer uses the **most** electricity.*

We have some timely new editions to the church library. Choose one of them, or one of the many other titles for some inspirational summer reading.

Marcus Borg: *Meeting Jesus Again for the First Time.*

Borg provides an account of contemporary Jesus scholarship and of his personal struggle to find authentic, mature faith. Auburn Theological Seminary said of Borg: "[He] is a writer of rare lucidity, original scholarly insights, profound spirituality, and the universal capacity to connect it all to life in the present."

C. S. Lewis, *Mere Christianity.*

Added to our collection of C. S. Lewis titles, this book spells out his strongly held and clearly thought-out interpretation of life. A Harper's Magazine reviewer said of his books, "The point about reading C. S. Lewis is that he makes you sure, whatever you

believe, that religion accepted or rejected means something extremely serious, demanding the entire energy of the mind."

Hans Küng, *Does God Exist?*

Written for men and women of all faiths (and of none), the author traces the rise of atheism in the works of such great thinkers as Descartes, Pascal, Feuerbach, Marx, Nietzsche, and Freud, and then demonstrates why a "yes" to God remains a more reasonable and responsible belief than its alternative.

Betty J. Eadie: *Embraced By the Light.*

This is the incredible account of one woman's near-death experience. At 39, Betty died in a hospital after undergoing surgery. The events that followed have been called "the most profound near-death experience ever." The book recounts the people she met, the

truths she learned, and the magnificent realities of the spirit world. Her life was changed forever.
