# Still Experiencing the Story



# Final Giving Note From Bruce Marks on 2021/2022 Finances

We finished last year in a far better financial position than we had originally anticipated. One last belated thank-you all for your generosity. Your faithfulness is inspiring and a true reflection of how we practice living a life based on the example of Christ.

As you know, we took a different, more ambitious path while working through the year's budget; instead of looking to cut back, we knew it would be a better choice to ask you to help by stepping up your giving. We trusted that God had a plan to see this happen. We did not want to see any of our programs or staff cut due to budgetary concerns, as it would impact our ability to do His work. You responded with even more than hoped for by increasing the pledges over last year by 30%. It was phenomenal to witness.

Paying off the mortgage took about \$15,000 out of the yearly budget, which takes some of the pressure off. But our work is not finished. Some of you pledged toward the mortgage for 2022, an amount totaling roughly \$10,000. If you made your pledge towards the mortgage, even though that mortgage is now paid off, your continued commitment to your pledge is important, as we used that in our decision-making process in pulling the remainder of the balance owed from the Memorial Fund. Now we are working towards paying that money "back" to the Memorial Fund. Only with your continued generous support via your pledged amount can we make this happen.

Thank you for your stewardship, not only in the finances of the church, but the outpouring of love you show to the Backpack program, Habitat, Mother's Cupboard, the Afghan refugees and every worthy cause which is on your heart. It is humbling to watch this show of faithfulness. Thank you...thank you...thank you

# Hoosier Hospitality to Refugees

A heartwarming article praising Indiana's generosity and work in aid to Afghan refugees was published last month. Written by Russ Hessler and Tyler Smith, it discusses the bigger picture of all that Hoosier volunteers were able to accomplish within the past four and a half months. Click the photo above to be linked to the Hessler and Smith article (as syndicated by the South Bend Tribune) or pick up the previous issue of the Brown County Democrat to read it for yourself.

This is feedback is well-deserved in the wake of a lot of good news as of late regarding Operation Allies Welcome. In the four months after the initiation of OAW, Camp Atterbury accepted roughly 7,200 refugees from Afghanistan. As of last week, only 1,200 of that number remain, and they are set to depart soon to permanent homes, allowing the safe heaven to close. This success was made in part due to the generous outpouring of aid by Hoosiers, who have been responsible for nearly 75% of the donations spread across all seven U.S. military that have housed Afghan refugees.

# **Project Lifesaver Has Come to Brown County!**

TRIAD and the Brown County Sheriff's Department are pleased to let you know that it is ready for use. Project Lifesaver is funded by grants from and through the Brown County Community Foundation (BCCF) and from Sheriff's Department funding.

Project Lifesaver combines electronic technologies with advanced training for search and rescue personnel in order to help quickly locate someone who has become lost, such as someone with Alzheimer's disease or autism or any such illness, who may be prone to wandering. Searches in our Brown County hills can be especially challenging.

Individuals enrolled in this program wear a personalized, wrist-watch sized radio transmitter that allows first responders to rapidly locate them. Rescue personnel receive specialized training, not only on how to operate the tracking equipment, but also on ways to address behavioral/communication challenges specific to people with cognitive conditions. This is a skill critical to gaining the person's trust and facilitating a safe return home.

Because of this BCCF grant and two additional grants through the Foundation, the cost of the program to individuals can be off-set, in part or in full. We expect to make this program available and affordable to any interested Brown County resident.

### **Ditty From the Library**


