BCPL to Host Brown County Juneteenth Celebration

The Brown County Public Library will lead the way in our community for this year's Juneteenth celebration. The event explores the history and importance of Juneteenth, and commemorate of the end of slavery in the United States.

Expect great things with the performance by tenor Sylvester Makobi and pianist Caludia Santan Nunez. They will perform African American spirituals, Swahili songs, and Mau Mau rebellion song.

Dr. Michael Cartwright will then lead a conversation framed by the songs "Lift Ev'ry Voice and Sing" by James Weldon Johnson and Bob Marley's "Redemption Song." Audience participation is encouraged and everyone is welcome.

Indiana Annual Conference to meet June 9—11 a.m.


Heritage Sunday May 22, 2022

Ditty From the Library



Elevation Retreat Provides Renewal and Continuing Education for Our Director of Music


From Tammera Lane, NUMC Director of Music:

Elevation is the name of a wonderful workshop on worship that I attended May at Lake Tahoe, Nevada. This event was made possible by the Lilly Endowment through our church's Clergy Renewal Grant that provided Pastor Mary's sabbatical. Fifty people who were pastors/music directors from around the country and from various Christian denominations attended the five-day retreat.

The workshop was led by Marcia McFee of Worship Design Studio, and Rob and I were both able to spend the week there. (If you have never been to Lake Tahoe, it needs to be on your list!) While you all were enjoying 90-degree temps, we were enjoying three inches of snow at an elevation of 6500 feet! It was so majestic and beautiful and very serene. They say that Lake is the second deepest in the country behind Crater Lake in Oregon, and one can actually see down to 70 feet.

The workshop was very invigorating and inspiring as well. As an added benefit, we both felt like it was a

personal retreat and were refreshed by being out there, with the intentional focus on spiritual things.



We are designed to worship, and we do. Every one of us worships something. What or whom do we worship?

We serve a very real God whom we need in the center of our lives. In whatever manner each of us worships, the Holy Presence is the destination. This is what we aim for in worship within our church services, as well as in a broader sense of worship which we do in our daily lives.

Human Rights Ordinance to Create Human Rights Commission for Brown County

In 1968 with the formation of the United Methodist Church, the General Commission on Religion and Race was formed to help the church be accountable for its rejection of the sin of racism in every aspect of the life of the church. Since that time the Commission has continued to provide leadership and resources for this work. Check out the resources on the GCRR website at https://www.gcorr.org

In 2020 the Indiana Conference of the United Methodist Church launched an initiative called **Indiana UM Against Racism** which renews the effort to recognize the sin of racism and to covenant to work for inclusion of work toward an anti-racist future. If you'd like to sign the INUMC Covenant to Dismantle Racism, you can find it at https://actionnetwork.org/forms/inumc-in-against-racism.

Just as racism has worked its way into most institutions of our society including the church, financial institutions, and government, so will it require institutional efforts to combat the power of racism. The Nashville Town Council is presently considering an ordinance that would create a Human Rights Commission to address issues of bias, discrimination and prejudice in Nashville and the Brown County community.

Denny Kubal, a member of NUMC has served on the committee to draft the guidelines for the proposed commission. It would create a 6-member volunteer commission charged with offering educational training to leaders in both the public and private sector regarding awareness of diversity in the community, offer educational programming for the community at large, and establish procedures regarding all complaints and calls related to human rights issues. You can view the proposed ordinance at https://www.townofnashville.org. A second reading of the ordinance will take place in July.
