Update from BC Weekend Backpacks

Below are a few noteworthy points from the BC Weekend Backpack Annual Report. For the program's September newsletter, check the Missions bulletin board; for the full report see Jan Swigert or contact the church office for a copy. Congratulations to BC Weekend Backpacks for their good work on behalf of Brown County Schools' children.

- It costs \$150/child per year to provide weekend meals through the BCWB program (33 weeks).
- BCWB distributes about \$420 worth of food to children each week during the school year
- The major fundraising event for BCWB is Touch A Truck, which raised \$8,500 in June 2019.
- 4,342 bags of food were packed during the 2018-2019 school year. An additional 16 bags/ week were packed through

July to serve children in Head Start.

- At an average weight of 7.25 Ibs/bag, 15.75 **tons** of good was distributed to hungry children in Brown County last year.
- As the 2019-2020 school year begins, BCWB is packing 118 backpacks each week to be distributed throughout the school system.



We've received some wonderful donations in the past few weeks that I'd like to share with you! We've had copies of both of these studies for several years and now they're more easily available by being in the church library!

First is **A Place at the Table** by Chris Seay. The book challenges Christians to eat like the poor for 40 days, meditating on how their lives differs from yours. It comes with 2 dvds and 2 guides. This set was used as an all-church study a few years ago and could be used again.

We also received **Love is an Orientation** by Andrew Marin, that elevates the conversation between Christianity and the LBGTQ community! It's a group study that includes 1 dvd and 7 participation guides.



UMCOR Actively Provides Assistance in the Wake of Hurricane Dorian

After striking the Bahama island nation on Sept. 1, Hurricane Dorian caused "vast devastation" and left 70,000 people in need of immediate humanitarian relief, says Mark Lowcock, head of the U.N. Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs.

The Bahamas Conference of the Methodist Church is fielding requests to help those being evacuated from the 'unprecedented devastation" to receive basic supplies and find a place to live, says its president, the Rev. L. Carla Culmer. Culmer also serves as the pastor at Wesley-Grants Town Church in Nassau.

"People are traumatized because the storm lasted so long," Culmer said. "We heard about 20 deaths, but we believe there are many more deaths." The receding floodwaters "will reveal a lot," she added. "And maybe some of the things it will reveal we won't be ready for."

Her conference's disaster response ministry, Bahamas Methodist Habitat, is based at Camp Symonette on Eleuthera Island. The Rev. Stephanie Gottschalk, a former Volunteers in Mission coordinator for the United Methodist Western Pennsvlvania Conference, has served as the organization's executive director since January 2018. Camp Symonette escaped major damage from Dorian. But Gottschalk pointed out that "Everyone is going to know somebody who was affected or who as injured or died." She noted that the population of the Bahamas is similar to Pittsburgh and that the 70,000 or so in the Dorian-affected areas "represents about 18 % of the population."

UMCOR has awarded a solidarity grant to Bahamas Methodist Habitat for immediate, emergency short-term funding to address basic human needs. The relief agency also expects to partner in the Bahamas with the Methodist Church in the Caribbean and the Americas. At this time donations to UMCOR are the best way for church members to respond. Placements for volunteer teams will come later.

How Is Our Church Organized?

As a congregation of the United Methodist Church, we are organized with a structure of committees and Board of Trustees with vision and overall planning led by the Church Council. You are invited to prayerfully consider participation in one of these areas.

<u>Church Council</u> — This is the leadership body of the church. The Church Council casts the vision and works closely with the pastor to lead and guide the church's ministry.

The Church Council is composed of the chairpersons of each of our major committees and also at-large members who serve as leaders but do not have specific committee responsibilities.

Staff-Parish Relations Commit-

tee: This is the church's personnel committee; creates and monitors policies for both the conduct and well-being of the church staff.

Board of Trustees: Cares for the upkeep of the buildings (church and parsonage) and property; is the legal representative of the church for matters of insurance, property, safety and building use.

Finance Committee: oversees the work of the treasurer and financial secretary, manages the church budget and serves as the Stewardship Committee; ensures that the assets and funds of the church are used wisely and according to the mission and vision of the congregation.

Nurture and Member Care Com-

mittee: coordinates the work of hospitality and the care of new members as well as tending to the creation of support, comfort and care of the entire congregation. Oversees Sunday morning hospitality teams, visitation teams, and seeks creative ways to encourage a caring fellowship within the life of the church. Missions Committee: Actively supports and enables the congregation's outreach to the community and to the world through service, funding and awareness. Coordinates food support of community hunger ministries (Mother's Cupboard, BC Weekend Backpacks and the local food pantries); coordinates projects that address the needs of children; works closely with the Nurture/Member Care Committee and Trustees to coordinate two Days of Caring: The Church Has Left the Building (fall) and the Trustee Work Day (spring).

Church and Society Commit-

tee: the congregation's voice for important matters of justice affecting the community and world both in raising awareness and creating partnerships for action. Issues addressed in recent years: drug recovery and addiction, hunger insecurity, human trafficking and the church's role in addressing ethical issues regarding LGQBT persons.

Worship and Witness: working closely with the pastor and music staff of the church, this committee coordinates worship in relation to church seasons, ongoing worship series and enriching worship through music and the arts. The committee works to make worship hospitable to people with differing perspectives, needs and experiences.

Lay Leadership Committee: this committee seeks to identify, encourage and train leaders in the church as cast vision for the church's ministry, accomplish tasks and organize the congregation's ministry.

Each of these committees is led by a member of the Church Council but the work could not be accomplished with the many people who participate on many



committees to plan, coordinate ministries, carry out tasks and offer their wisdom and insight about our life together as Christians.

FallFare: FallFare is our annual fund-raiser for mission funds that are given to the community and various mission projects around the state and the world. A chairperson is named each year - often co-chairs — that coordinates the event along with the help of Booth chairs. The reward for the Booth chair is that that chairperson designates how 1/2 of the proceeds from the booth will be used. The remaining funds from all booths are distributed by a gathering after FallFare where many projects are considered. Planning for FallFare begins on January 2 when the Village Green is reserved and continues until the first Saturday of October!

Our congregation is very active! In addition to these organizing teams, people participate in many ways:

- Hospitality Teams
- Mother's Cupboard serving team
- The Tribe (moms who gather for study and fellowship)
- United Methodist Women United Methodist Men (serves monthy meal for NUMY)
- Chancel Choir
- Kitchen Team (keeps church kitchens clean and organized)
- Sanctuary team (keeps sanctuary organized and ready for worship)
- Liturgists
- Prayer team
- Sunday School teachers
- Other creative ministries

How will you offer yourself in ministry in 2020? Please prayerfully consider an area of interest and talk with Pastor Mary.

We are also part of the connection of United Methodists around the world, and there are many areas of service within our Indiana Annual Conference. If you are interested in serving beyond the local church, Pastor Mary can help.
